RUSHING PROWESS AGAIN PROVES ITS VALUE

"All of these teams – Carolina, us – are running the ball," says New Orleans Saints head coach **JIM HASLETT**. "People are running the ball against nickel defenses. They're packing it in with three tight ends and running the ball."

They're running the ball because it translates into success. In 2004, <u>six of the top 10 rushing teams made the playoffs</u>. Or, looking at it in another way, five of the six clubs to rush more than pass went to the playoffs. And the Vikings – fourth overall in rushing – missed the playoffs only on the final play of their season!

Twelve-year NFL safety **COREY HARRIS** knows the bread-and-butter of most teams. "I don't care if you're Brett Favre, Dan Marino, or John Elway," he says. "If your team can't run, you're in trouble."

The biggest advantage to a sound running game is ball control; the longer an offense can maintain possession, the more strain it puts on an opposing defense. Also, ball control strategy lets a team rest its own defense for longer periods of time.

One way to protect your quarterback effectively is to keep more blockers in for maximum protection and use more three or "quick-five" drops in the passing game. The other way is to run the ball effectively and keep the defense off balance.

"Everyone is protecting the quarterback now," says Haslett. "Nobody is seven-step dropping. They're three-step, max-protecting and running the football."

Though the advantages of a sound running game are quite tangible, there are residual intangible benefits that can work wonders for a team. Nothing gives an offense a bigger boost than a slow, steady 10-play drive for a touchdown. Conversely, an opposing offense can get frustrated the longer it has to wait for another possession.

WANT TO GO TO SUPER BOWL? STOP THE 100-YARD RUSHER!

Last year, the Miami Dolphins were the lone team not to allow a 100-yard rusher in a game. And although the Dolphins, who won 10 games and finished second in the AFC East, did not go to the playoffs, three of the other four teams that performed the feat in the past five years not only made the playoffs, but proceeded on to the Super Bowl, with two winning it!

"When you stop the run, you can put more pressure on the quarterback," says New England Patriots Pro Bowl defensive tackle **RICHARD SEYMOUR**. "You can then just play the ball and get to the passer. But if you can't stop the run, they can do a lot of things to you."

BIG YARDS ON FIRST DOWN COULD MEAN PLAYOFFS

Add up the five teams of last season with the most yards gained on first down, and you've got five playoff teams – the Colts, Chiefs, Packers, Seahawks and Broncos. Obviously, gaining big yards on first down makes it easier to keep the ball and move down the field.

"The greatest situation for all quarterbacks is having success on first-down," says Tampa Bay Buccaneers quarterback **BRAD JOHNSON**. "That's the benchmark of a team right there. Whether it's a four-yard run, or a six-yard completion, we really try for success on first down."

Creating "third-and-manageable" situations are key to any offense. There is a tremendous difference between third-and-three versus a third-and-six, which limits your options offensively. Conversely, keeping your opponent in third-and-long situations is a solid recipe for success.
