THE NFL? UNPREDICTABLE!

When it comes to predicting playoff teams in the National Football League, the proposition can be downright impossible.

"Every Sunday you get great games," says Atlanta Falcons head coach **JIM MORA**. "Everything is so close. It's crazy to be involved in this."

Three of the past five Super Bowl champions had never won the game before, and three of them weren't even in the playoffs the year before.

"You never know in this league," says Green Bay Packers quarterback BRETT FAVRE.

THE NFL IS SO UNPREDICTABLE THAT IN 2004...

- Two teams Atlanta and San Diego went from "worst to first" in their divisions, finishing last in 2003 and first in 2004.
- <u>Five teams made the playoffs</u> that were not in the playoffs the year before, the eighth consecutive season in which at least five teams (out of 12) accomplished the feat.
- One division the NFC West had its ninth new division champion (Seattle) in the past nine seasons.
- Almost half the games (47 percent) were decided by one score (eight points or less), and almost a quarter (24 percent) were decided by three points or less.

KICKOFF WEEKEND

<u>Since 1978</u>, when the NFL went to a 16-game schedule, and excluding the abbreviated season of 1982, teams that are victorious on Kickoff Weekend are more than twice as likely to reach the playoffs than losers of an opening game:

Of the 378 teams which won openers...199 went to the playoffs (110 won division titles).

Of the 378 teams which lost openers...89 went to the playoffs (51 won division titles).

<u>In 2004</u>, 11 of the 12 playoff teams – Atlanta, Denver, Green Bay, Minnesota, New England, New York Jets, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, San Diego and Seattle – were victorious on Kickoff Weekend.
