## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2005

The **NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS** have won two consecutive Super Bowls and can become the first team in NFL history to win three Super Bowls in a row.

The Patriots need one playoff victory to pass the Green Bay Packers (9, 1961-62, 1965-67) for the most consecutive postseason victories in NFL history. New England has won nine playoff games in a row.

The <u>PHILADELPHIA EAGLES</u> have played in four consecutive Championship Games and can become the second team (Oakland, 1973-77) in NFL history to appear in five Championship Games in a row.

The <u>PITTSBURGH STEELERS</u> have won 14 consecutive regular season games and need five wins in a row for the longest regular-season winning streak in NFL history (New England Patriots, 18).

The **CHICAGO BEARS** need four regular season victories to become the first team with 650 regular season victories.

The **NEW YORK GIANTS** need seven victories to become the third team (Chicago Bears, 660 and Green Bay Packers, 636) with 600 total victories.

The **OAKLAND RAIDERS** need 10 regular season victories to reach 400 regular season victories.

## NFL: A CONSISTENCY OF WINNING

Sure, every year in the NFL there are surprise teams. That's the appeal of the league to fans – their team has a chance! But when looking at tendencies, there is a surprising consistency of teams that go to the playoffs and win Super Bowls.

Of the 12 teams that made the 2004 playoffs, seven were winners of the past 10 Super Bowls. In that time, one of those teams (New England) has played in four Super Bowls, and three (Denver, Green Bay and St. Louis) in two Super Bowls, while Atlanta played in Super Bowl XXXIII and Pittsburgh in XXX. During that span, the Patriots have won three championships and the Broncos have won two. The other winners include Tampa Bay, Baltimore, St. Louis, Green Bay and Dallas.

Put differently, seven of last year's 12 playoff teams have had 13 of the 20 Super Bowl appearances of the past 10 seasons. Most of last season's playoff teams have had consistently strong cumulative won-loss records in recent seasons, headed by Philadelphia with a 59-21 (.738) regular-season record over the past five years. In fact, the top five teams with the best regular-season records since 2000 qualified for the postseason last year.
