Kansas City Chiefs fullback **TONY RICHARDSON**, New York Giants wide receiver **AMANI TOMMER**, and Arizona Cardinals quarterback **KURT WARNER** spent a week during the offseason visiting Tsunami victims. The trio traveled to Banda Aceh, Indonesia and Sri Lanka, some of the worst hit areas, to help rebuild communities through the UN World Food Program. The goal of the players' trip was not only to deliver food but, more importantly, to promote a message of hope and caring to survivors.

"I think that the greatest encouragement that anybody can have goes beyond money, beyond resources, beyond food and the essentials," says Warner. "It is the understanding that people care and that people love them. That's where I think that the greatest effect is shown, just letting people know that they are important."

Atlanta Falcons running back **WARRICK DUNN** and New England Patriots special teamer **LARRY IZZO** spent a week this past spring visiting troops in Afghanistan, Iraq and Kuwait as part of the USO-NFL "Salute the Troops Tour." For example, New York Giants running back **TIKI BARBER** has honed his skills as a media personality, appearing on the YES Network's "This Week in Football," and, this offseason, serving as a guest host on "FOX & Friends" on the FOX News Channel.

Barber's interest in preparing for a future career in broadcasting began early in his NFL playing days.

"It was my second or third year, and I was average at best," says Barber of his first few seasons in the NFL. "So I was looking for other things to do. I wanted to come in and do sportscasting."

Since then, Barber's playing career has taken off. But it appears that he has a promising career ahead of him in the media as well.

Tennessee Titans tight end **ERRON KINNEY** spends his offseasons working as a volunteer firefighter. Kinney, who became a certified firefighter during his sophomore year at Florida, has had a passion for firefighting since he was a little boy. And it shows.

"He's an excellent firefighter," says Brooklyn firefighter Andrew Gilmore, who trained with Kinney on Randall's Island in New York City. "He will be an asset to any fire department he goes to when his NFL career is over."
