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NFL AND NFL PLAYERS ASSOCIATION JOIN NATIONAL INSTITUTE ON DRUG ABUSE TO PRODUCE ANTI-STEROID TELEVISION MESSAGE

Spots to Begin Airing Nationally This Weekend During NFL Games

The NFL and NFL Players Association, in partnership with the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA), will begin airing during this weekend's NFL games a series of television spots to raise awareness of the dangers of steroid use among young people, it was announced today.

The spots will air throughout the season during NFL games and on other daytime and primetime programming of the NFL's television partners (ABC, CBS, FOX and ESPN) and on NFL Network. They were developed in conjunction with NIDA, which supports most of the world's research on the health aspects of drug abuse and addiction.

The spots were originally slated to run on NFL Kickoff Weekend (September 11-12) but were postponed due to the NFL's Hurricane Katrina fund-raising efforts. NFL Films taped the spots August 30 with students, ages 12-18, at Cinnaminson High School in Cinnaminson, New Jersey.

The spots open in a hallway filled with students who disappear as the copy boldly warns viewers about the dangers of steroids and the need to learn more about the serious adverse health effects of steroid use.

The copy reads as follows:

Your future.

It's up to you

And what you do.

Don't get caught in the dark.

Steroids are dangerous.

The spots close by encouraging viewers to log on to NIDA's website section on steroids, <u>www.steroidabuse.gov</u>, to learn more about the negative effects of steroids.
