KANSAS CITY CHIEFS (9-7) at INDIANAPOLIS COLTS (12-4)

Making an NFL-best seventh playoff appearance in the past eight seasons and serving as a playoff host for the fourth consecutive season, the Indianapolis Colts, 12-4, meet the Kansas City Chiefs, 9-7, on Saturday, January 6 in the AFC Wildcard Playoffs. Kickoff for the contest, telecast nationally by NBC Sports and Westwood One is 4:30 p.m. (EST)/3:30 p.m. (CST).

The Colts and Chiefs are meeting for the third time in the playoffs. Indianapolis owns a 2-0 playoff mark against Kansas City, with Divisional Playoff victories in Arrowhead Stadium following the 1995 and 2003 seasons. The Colts closed regular-season play last Sunday at home with a 27-22 victory over Miami. Kansas City bested Jacksonville at home, 35-30, and qualified as the sixth-seeded AFC club. Kansas City earned its spot following its victory, plus losses by Cincinnati, Tennessee and Denver.

The Colts own the NFL's best regular-season record (89-39) since the start of the 1999 season, while being the only team to earn seven playoff appearances in the last eight seasons. Indianapolis enters the playoffs as victors in 34 of its last 41 league games. Indianapolis' winning ways include a 23-7 record in AFC South play, while the club has owned or shared the lead in 78 of 85 weeks of the division's existence.

Indianapolis won its club-record fourth consecutive division title in 2006, and accomplishing the feat made the Colts one of 15 teams since the 1970 Merger to win 4+ consecutive division titles: (7, LA Rams, NFC West, 1973-79; 6, Minnesota, NFC Central, 1973-78; 6, Pittsburgh, AFC Central, 1974-79; 5, Oakland, AFC West, 1972-76; 5, Chicago, NFC Central, 1984-88; 5, San Francisco, NFC West, 1986-90; 5, Dallas, NFC East, 1992-96; 4, Miami, AFC East, 1971-74; 4, Dallas, NFC East, 1976-79; 4, Buffalo, AFC East, 1988-91; 4, San Francisco, NFC West, 1992-95; 4, Pittsburgh, AFC Central, 1994-97; 4, Philadelphia, NFC East, 2001-04; 4, New England, AFC East, 2003-06). The Colts (14-2, 2005; 12-4, 2003, 2004 and 2006) have joined Dallas (1992-95) as the only NFL teams to win 12+ games in four consecutive seasons. Indianapolis owns a 50-14 record over the past four regular seasons, to rank among the NFL's winningest teams over any four-year span (52, Chicago, 1985-88; 52, San Francisco, 1989-92; 51, San Francisco, 1987-90; 50, Chicago, 1984-87; 49, Buffalo, 1990-93; 49, Dallas, 1992-95; 49, San Francisco, 1994-97).

COLTS-CHIEFS SERIES NOTES

The Colts and Chiefs have met 15 times in the regular season and twice in the playoffs. The Colts lead the league series, 8-7. The Colts also won the playoff meetings between the clubs, 10-7 in the Divisional Playoffs at Arrowhead Stadium on January 7, 1996 and 38-31 in the Divisional Playoffs at Kansas City on January 11, 2004. Indianapolis owned a seven-game series winning streak counting the post-season games, until Kansas City posted a 45-35 win in Arrowhead Stadium on October 31, 2004, the last meeting between the teams. Scoring on five consecutive first-half possessions, Kansas City earned a 31-14 halftime lead that helped result in a 45-35 win. The Chiefs amassed 590 yards behind QB-Trent Green (27-34-389, 3 TDs) and RB-Priest Holmes (32-143, 3 TDs), while the Colts totaled

505 net yards behind QB-Peyton Manning (25-44-472, 5 TDs/1 int.). Leading only 7-0, the Colts cut the deficit to 31-28 and 38-35, but could never catch the Chiefs. WR-Reggie Wayne (6-119, 2 TDs; 41t, 6t) and Marvin Harrison (5-119, 2 TDs; 52t, 22t) had big days, as did Chiefs TE-Tony Gonzalez (8-125, 2 TDs). It was Manning's second 5-TD game of the season. The game marked the first in club history with the teams combining 1,000+ yards of net offense (1,095). In last playoff meeting, scoring on six of eight possessions and leading throughout the contest, the Colts posted a 38-31 win at Kansas City. Indianapolis scored on its first possession and opened 14-3 first-quarter and 21-10 halftime leads in posting the win. Manning (22-30-304, 3 TDs, 138.8 rating) teamed with Harrison (6-98),

Wayne (6-83, 1 TD; 19t) and Brandon Stokley (4-57, 1 TD; 29t) and RB-Tom Lopienski (1-2, 1 TD; 2t) to guide the passing game. RB-Edgerrin James was 26-125, 2 TDs; 11t, 1t) to pace the rushing attack. Indianapolis totaled 434 net yards. Holmes was 24-176, 2 TDs rushing, while Green was 18-30-212, 1 TD for Kansas City. Indianapolis failed to score on half-ending and game-ending drives, but scored on all six other possessions. The club did not punt for the second consecutive playoff game, and the game stood as the only one in NFL history where both teams failed to punt. The teams played in 1999, 2000 and 2001. On October 25, 2001, the Indianapolis defense produced three sacks, three interceptions and held the Chiefs to 101 rushing yards as the club bolted from a 7-3 halftime lead to win, 35-28. Manning was 19-30-201, 2 TDs, while James was 27-102 and Harrison was 8-98, 1 TD (47t). The Colts kept ahead of the Chiefs with the play of RB-Dominic Rhodes, who tallied an 88t KOR and 77t rush, becom-

ing the only player in club history with 70+ and 80+ TD plays in the same game. Rhodes was thrust into action as James suffered a season-ending knee injury. On September 3, 2000, the Colts produced their first opening-day road win since 1983 in topping the Chiefs, 27-14. James (28-124, 1 TD rushing/6-40, 1 TD receiving) and Manning (22-32-273, 1 TD/int.) paced the way. The teams met on November 7, 1999 as Indianapolis took a 25-17 win in the RCA Dome. The Colts appeared in Kansas City on December 15, 1996, and came away with a 24-19 victory. Harrison was 6-103, 3 TDs to set the club rookie record for scoring receptions in a game. The first playoff match between the clubs was the Divisional Playoffs on January 7, 1996. The 10-7 Colts faced the 13-3 Chiefs in arctic conditions (11 degrees, -9 degrees with wind chill) and took a 10-7 victory to advance to the AFC Championship Game.

COLTS PLAYOFF HISTORY

The Colts' playoff berth represented the 20th in the 54-year history of the team, the 10th since moving to Indianapolis in 1984, the ninth in the past 12 years and the seventh in the past eight seasons. The 2006 season marked Year Five of the Owner and C.E.O **Jim Irsay**-President **Bill Polian**-Head Coach **Tony Dungy** regime. Under Irsay's stewardship, the Colts have made the playoffs nine times in the past 12 years, including consecutive seasons from 1999-2000 and 2002-06. Polian's teams have produced a combined regular-season record of 189-130 with him as either general manager or president. Discounting his first two building years in Buffalo and his first seasons with Carolina and the Colts, his record is 173-82. In 19 seasons as a general manager or president, his teams have made 13 playoff and six conference championship game appearances. Dungy directed Tampa Bay to playoff appearances four times in six seasons. His 1999 Buccaneers squad advanced to the NFC Championship Game, losing in the final seconds. Dungy is the winningest head coach in the NFL from 1999-2006 with a regular season record of 90-38. Dungy is the 8th head coach to direct the Colts into post-season play. He joined the Colts in 2002 after producing a 54-42 regular season (2-4 in playoffs) with Tampa Bay from 1996-2001. This year's squad produced the 16th 10+-victory season in franchise history. Dungy is one of five Colts head coaches to earn double-digit victory totals (5, Tony Dungy; 4, Don Shula; 3, Ted Marchibroda; 2, Don McCafferty; 2, Jim Mora). This marks Dungy's eighth career double-digit victory season (10-6, 1997; 11-5, 1999; 10-6, 2000 with Tampa Bay; 10-6, 2002; 12-4, 2003; 12-4, 2004; 14-2, 2005; 12-4, 2006 with Colts). Dungy (1999-06) has earned eight consecutive playoff appearances (99-01, Tampa Bay; 02-06, Colts), ranking only behind Tom Landry (9, Dallas, 1975-83), while being tied with Chuck Noll (8, Pittsburgh, 1972-79) for the most consecutive playoff appearances by NFL head coaches since 1970.

HEAD COACHES

TONY DUNGY is 60-20 at the Colts' helm. Dungy joined the Colts on January 22, 2002, after serving as Tampa Bay's head coach for six seasons (1996-01). Dungy's career regular-season record is 114-62, and he has an overall record of 120-70. Dungy became the 35th coach in NFL history to earn 100 career victories with a 38-20 win at Houston on 10/23/05. Dungy became the 20th coach since entering the league in 1970 to win 100 career games. Of those 20, only George Seifert (132), Joe Gibbs (148), Mike Ditka (151), Mike Holmgren (160) and Mike Shanahan (161) reached 100 career wins faster than Dungy's pace of 163 games. Dungy recorded his 100th regular-season victory vs. Tennessee 12/4/05, becoming only the 6th coach to win 100+ regular-season games in the first 10 years as a head coach (113, Seifert; 105, Don Shula; 103, John Madden; 102, Dungy; 101, Gibbs; 101, Ditka).

Dungy owns a 90-38 mark since the start of the 1999 season (30-18 at Tampa Bay; 60-20 with Colts), and he is the NFL's winningest coach during that span. He has directed nine of his eleven teams into the playoffs, while leading Tampa Bay (1999) and the Colts (2003) to the conference championship game. Dungy took Tampa Bay to four playoff appearances during his tenure as field general. Dungy has directed the Colts to 10-6, 12-4, 12-4, 14-2 and 12-4 records, becoming the only coach in club history to produce 10+ victories and playoff berths in the first five seasons with the team. In 2006, Dungy helped produce the 16th 10+-victory season in franchise history, and he is one of five Colts head coaches to earn double-digit victory totals (5, Dungy; 4, Shula; 3, Marchibroda; 2, McCafferty; 2, Jim Mora). Dungy has eight career double-digit victory seasons (10-6, 1997; 11-5, 1999; 10-6, 2000 with Tampa Bay; 10-6, 2002; 12-4, 2003; 12-4, 2004; 14-2, 2005; 12-4, 2006 with Colts), and he was the first coach to defeat all 32 NFL teams. The Colts have produced an 89-39 regular-season record since 1999, a victory total that leads the NFL. The Colts are the only team to qualify for post-season play seven times in the last eight seasons. Indianapolis has won the AFC South four consecutive seasons and has owned or shared the division lead in 78 of 85 weeks of AFC South existence. Under Dungy, the Colts are 32-8 at home and 28-12 on the road. Dungy (1999-06) has earned eight consecutive playoff appearances (1999-01 at Tampa Bay; 2002-06 with Colts), ranking only behind Tom Landry (9, Dallas, 1975-83), while being tied with Chuck Noll (8, Pittsburgh, 1972-79), for the

most consecutive playoff appearances by NFL coaches since 1970. The Colts (14-2, 2005; 12-4, 2003, 2004 and 2006) have joined Dallas (1992-95) as the only NFL teams to win 12+ games in four consecutive seasons. The Colts own a 53-17 record (counting the playoffs) since the start of the 2003 season and are 39-12 since 2004. Dungy held a 54-42 record as head coach with Tampa Bay, qualifying for the playoffs four times in six seasons. Dungy produced some of the NFL's stingiest defenses during his years at Tampa Bay. His units ranked no lower than 11th during his stay and ranked 6th or higher in four of his last five years. Dungy also served 1981-88 with Pittsburgh, including 1984-88 as defensive coordinator. After serving 1989-91 as DB Coach at Kansas City, Dungy was the defensive coordinator at Minnesota from 1992-95. During his years in Minnesota, the Vikings intercepted an NFL-high 95 passes and made three playoff appearances. The Chiefs made two playoff appearances during Dungy's tenure. At Pittsburgh in 1984, he became the NFL's youngest coordinator (age 28). In five seasons as Pittsburgh's coordinator, the Steelers averaged 24 interceptions and 37 takeaways, while scoring 20 touchdowns. Dungy entered the coaching ranks in 1980 at his alma mater, Minnesota, where he was a quarterback (1973-76). He made the Steelers as a free agent in 1977 and was a member of the Super Bowl XIII title team, then was traded to San Francisco in 1979. Dungy is a native of Jackson, Mich.

HERMAN EDWARDS was named the 10th head coach of Kansas City on January 9, 2006. Edwards was named the 13th full-time head coach in Jets history on January 28, 2001, and he directed the club to a 41-44 overall record. Edwards previously served as Assistant Head Coach/DB Coach with Tampa Bay from 1996-00. The 1999 Tampa Bay squad faced eventual Super Bowl XXXIV champion St. Louis in the NFC Championship Game and held the high-powered Rams offense to eleven points. Edwards served as a scout (1990-91, 1995) and DB Coach (1992-94) with Kansas City. He began his pro coaching career as a participant in the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship program with Kansas City in 1989. Edwards played defensive back at California (1972, 74), Monterey Peninsula JC (1973) and San Diego State (1975-76). He played with Philadelphia (1977-85), the Los Angeles Rams (1986) and Atlanta (1986). He is a native of Monmouth, N.J.

The Colts stand as the NFL's winningest team since the start of the 1999 season. The Colts own a 89-39 record during that span. Colts Head Coach Tony Dungy was 30-18 with Tampa Bay from 1999-2001. He is 60-20 with the Colts, and his 90 wins during that span are the most in the NFL.

PLAYER NOTES -- PEYTON MANNING, MARVIN HARRISON AND DWIGHT FREENEY

QB-Peyton Manning has started the first 144 regular-season games of his career. Manning (3,131-4,890-37,586, 275, TDs/139 ints. 94.4 rating, career; 362-557-4,397, 31 TDs/9 ints., 101.0 rating, 2006) has produced the longest career-opening starting streak by any QB in NFL history, and the longest streak ever by a Colts QB. Manning is only the fifth Colts player with 100+ consecutive starts (115, C-Ken Mendenhall; 104, DE-Fred Cook; 102, DB-Jason Belser; 101, OT-Tarik Glenn). He was 25-41-276, 1 TD/int. at NYG 9/10. He was 26-38-400, 3 TDs vs. Houston 9/17 to earn AFC Offensive Player-of-the-Week honors. He was 14-31-219, 1 TD vs. Jacksonville 9/24, and had a 2t rush. He was 21-30-217, 1 TD at NYJ 10/1, conducting two fourth-quarter comeback TD drives, including a 1t rush in the final minute for the win. He became the first Colts quarterback ever with a game-winning touchdown run in the final minute of a game. He was 20-31-166, 2 TDs/1 int. Tennessee 10/8. Manning was 25-35-342, 4 TDs vs. Washington 10/22. Manning finished the Washington game with 256 career touchdown passes, and he surpassed Hall of Fame QBs-Dan Fouts (254) and Sonny Jurgensen (255) for 10th-place in NFL history. Manning also earned AFC Offensive Player-of-the-Week honors. He was 32-39-345, 3 TDs at Denver 10/29. He directed five second-half scoring drives, including two in the last seven minutes. Manning had three second-half scoring passes against a defense that had yielded but two touchdowns in its first six games. Manning earned AFC Offensive Player-of-the-Month honors for October. He was 20-36-326, 2 TDs/1 int. at New England 11/5, and he became the first Colts quarterback since John Unitas (1963) to surpass 300 passing yards in three consecutive games. He was 27-39-236, 1 TD vs. Buffalo 11/12, surpassing Dave Krieg for 9th-place in NFL career touchdown passes. He was 20-39-254, 2 TDs/int. at Dallas 11/19. Manning was 14-20-183, 1 TD/int. vs. Philadelphia 11/26. He was 21-28-351, 1 TD/2 ints. at Tennessee 12/3. He was 25-50-313, 1 int. at Jacksonville 12/10. He was 29-36-282, 4 TDs vs. Cincinnati 12/18, surpassing Vinny Testaverde for 8th-place in NFL career touchdown passes. He was 21-27-205, 3 TDs Houston 12/24, topping 4,000+ seasonal passing yards, and his seven 4,000+ seasons are the new NFL record (6, Marino). He was 22-37-282, 2 TDs vs. Miami 12/31, surpassing Joe Montana for 7th-place in NFL career touchdown passes. He has thrown touchdown passes in 127 of 144 games, for two or more touchdowns in 83 games and for four or more touchdowns in 15 outings. Manning has 25+ touchdown passes in a league-record nine consecutive seasons, and he has nine of the 19 20+-touchdown seasons in club history. Manning has nine consecutive 3,000+ seasons and owns nine of the 15 3,000+ seasons in Colts history (3, Unitas; 3, Jones). He is the only NFL QB ever to have nine 3,000+ seasons to open a career. Manning's streak of nine consecutive 3,000+ seasons is the 2nd-longest streak in NFL history (15, Brett Favre; 9, Dan Marino). He also is the only NFL player to have 4,000+ passing yards in six consecutive seasons (1999-04). Manning has completed more passes and thrown for more yards and touchdowns in a career-opening nine-year span than any NFL player. Manning (2003, 2004) is a two-time MVP by the Associated Press, and he is a seven-time Pro Bowler (1999-00, 02-06). His five consecutive nominations rank among the best in club history (8, John Unitas, 1957-64; 8, OG/T-Jim Parker, 1958-65; 8, WR-Marvin Harrison, 1999-06; 6, DE-Gino Marchetti, 1959-64; 5, DT-Art Donovan, 1953-57; 5, OT-Chris Hinton, 1985-89; 5, RB-Lenny Moore, 1958-62). Manning has amassed three perfect rating games (10/22/00 vs. New England; 11/10/02 at Philadelphia; 9/28/03 at New Orleans), the most by any NFL player since the rating system was created in 1973 (he added a perfect game in the playoffs 1/4/04 vs. Denver). Manning authored his seventh career double-digit victory season in 2006, and he is the club leader in 10+-victory seasons by a quarterback (3, Unitas; 3, Jones). Manning has teamed with 26 different players for touchdowns and has tossed scoring passes in 28 of the 30 arenas he has played in during regular-season action. The only venues where Manning has appeared and did not toss a scoring pass are the TWA Dome (2001) and Qwest Field (2005). Manning (49, 2004) is the 3rd NFL QB with a 40+-TD season (48, Marino, 1984; 44, Marino, 1986; 41, Kurt

Warner, St. Louis, 1999). Manning has seven 400+ career games and ranks among the NFL leaders (13, Marino; 7, Joe Montana; 7, Warren Moon). Manning had six 4+-TD games in 2004 to tie Marino (1984) for the NFL's best seasonal total. Manning's six 5+-TD games tie Marino's NFL record for most in a career. Manning had 100+ rating outings in 11 of 16 games in 2004 and had nine straight 100+ games, tying the longest NFL seasonal streak since the rating was implemented in 1972. He has had 100+ rating games in 53 career outings. Manning had a 104.1 rating in 2005, his 2nd consecutive 100+ season (121.1, 2004), and he became the first QB since Steve Young (1996-97) to be the NFL's top-rated player in consecutive seasons. His three-year span counting 2006's 101.0 rating makes him the first QB to do so since Young's four-year span from 1991-94. In 2004, Manning set the club seasonal record for passing yards (4,557) and completion percentage (67.6). In 2004, he threw more touchdown passes (49) than 26 other NFL teams scored total touchdowns. With a minimum of 20 attempts per game, Manning has 38 career outings with a 70.0+ completion percentage (1, 1998; 3, 1999; 2, 2000; 2, 2001; 6, 2002; 5, 2003; 6, 2004; 6, 2005; 7, 2006). Manning has 40 career 300+ games to rank among the NFL leaders (63, Marino; 51, Dan Fouts; 49, Warren Moon; 48, Favre). Manning surpassed Unitas (2,796) for the most completions in club history vs. Houston 9/17/06. He topped 3,000 career completions vs. Philadelphia 11/26/06 in his 139th career game, the fastest NFL pace to that plateau (146 games, Marino and Drew Bledsoe). Manning was named the NFL Offensive Player-of-the-Year and NFL All-Pro by the Associated Press for his 2004 regular season performance. Manning was named the Associated Press NFL Most Valuable Player for his play in 2004. It marked the second consecutive season he won the award (sharing honors in 2003 with QB-Steve McNair). Manning joined Brett Favre (1995-97) and Joe Montana (1989-90) as the only players to win the award in consecutive seasons. Favre's three nominations are the most in the history of the award, while Manning is tied for second-most with Montana, John Unitas (1964, 1967), Steve Young (1992, 1994), Kurt Warner (1999, 2001) and Jim Brown (1957, 1965) as multiple-winners. Notable players and Hall-of-Famers who won the award once include John Elway, Dan Marino, Terry Bradshaw, Fran Tarkenton, Walter Payton, Marcus Allen and Lawrence Taylor.

WR-Marvin Harrison (1,022-13,697, 122 TDs career; 95-1,366, 12 TDs 2006) is an eight-time Pro Bowler (1999-06). His eight straight bids rank with John Unitas (8, 1957-64) and OG/T-Jim Parker (8, 1958-65) for the longest streaks in Colts history. He was 9-113 at NYG 9/17 and was 7-127 vs. Houston 9/24, surpassing WR-Art Monk (940) for the 5th-most receptions in NFL history. He was 6-94 vs. Jacksonville 9/24. He was 7-79 at NYJ 10/1, surpassing WR-Andre Reed (951) for the 4th-most NFL receptions and Monk (12,721) for 9th-place in NFL career reception yards. He was 3-29, 1 TD vs. Tennessee 10/8. He was 7-73, 2 TDs vs. Washington 10/22, surpassing WR-Irving Fryar (12,785) for 8th-place in NFL career reception yards. He was 5-38 at Denver 10/29. He was 8-145, 2 TDs at New England 11/5, surpassing RB-Lenny Moore (113) in franchise career touchdowns. He was 2-21 vs. Buffalo 11/12. Harrison was 6-94 at Dallas 11/19, surpassing Steve Largent (13,089) for 7th-most NFL career reception yards. He was 1-8 vs. Philadelphia 11/26. He was 7-172, 1 TD at Tennessee 12/3, surpassing Andre Reed (13,198) for 6th-most NFL career reception yards. He was 6-101 at Jacksonville 12/10, becoming the 4th player in NFL history with 1,000+ career receptions. He was 8-86, 3 TDs vs. Cincinnati 12/18. Harrison was 8-112, 2 TDs at Houston 12/24. He was 5-74, 1 TD vs. Miami 12/31. Harrison has receptions in his first 170 career games, the NFL record for most consecutive games to start a career. He snapped RB-Marshall Faulk's (158) prior mark vs. Tennessee. Harrison has bettered the club career receiving records of WR-Raymond Berry (631-9,275, 68 TDs). In 2006, Harrison produced his 8th 1,000+ reception yardage season, extending his club record for most 1,000+ and most consecutive 1,000+ seasons. Harrison has 8 of the 16 1,000+ reception yardage seasons achieved in Colts history. His eight total 1,000+ seasons rank among the NFL career leaders (14, Jerry Rice;

9, Tim Brown; 9, Jimmy Smith; 8, Steve Largent; 8, Cris Carter; 8, Rod Smith), while eight consecutive rank among the all-time leaders (11, Rice, 1986-96; 9, Brown, 1993-01; 8, Carter, 1993-00). Harrison ranks 4th in NFL career receptions, 6th in NFL career reception yards, 3rd in NFL career touchdown receptions and 2nd in NFL career 100+-yard games. His eight 1,000+ scrimmage yards seasons are a club record, surpassing RB-Lenny Moore and RB-Edgerrin James for the most in Colts history. Eight consecutive 1,000+ scrimmage yards seasons (1999-06) are a club record. He had been tied with Moore (5, 1957-61), Mitchell (5, 1973-77) and Faulk (5, 1994-98) for the club mark in that category prior to 2004. Harrison's 13,725 career scrimmage yards rank 1st in Colts history. Harrison is the only NFL player with 10+ touchdown receptions in the last eight consecutive seasons. Harrison (13,912) ranks 1st in Colts career total yards (12,449, Moore). Harrison's 122 touchdowns surpass Moore (113) for the most in Colts history. Harrison was 9-109, 2 TDs at Tennessee 10/2/05 and became the 16th NFL player with 100 career touchdowns. He is one of seven players with 100+ career touchdown receptions (197, Rice; 130, Carter; 114, Terrell Owens; 101, Moss; 100, Largent; 100, Brown). Harrison has 28 multiple-touchdown games, including nine 3-TD outings (at Kansas City 12/15/96; at San Francisco 10/18/98; at New England 9/19/99; vs. Minnesota 12/24/00; vs. Buffalo 9/23/01; vs. Miami 11/11/01; at New Orleans 9/28/03; at Detroit 11/25/04; vs. Cincinnati 12/18/06). Harrison (59) ranks 2nd in NFL history in 100+ games (76, Rice). Harrison reached 600 receptions in 102 games, 700 in 114 games, 800 in 131 games, 900 in 149 games and 1,000 in 167 games, the fastest paces to those reception totals (Herman Moore, 600 in 118 games; Rice 700 in 139 games, 800 in 154 games, 900 in 168 games and 1,000 in 181 games were the prior records). Harrison and Rice are the only NFL players with 80+ receptions in eight consecutive seasons.

Manning and Harrison have combined for 106 touchdowns, the most potent touchdown duo in NFL history. Manning and Harrison passed John Unitas and Berry (63) at Tampa Bay 10/6/03 for the club record and passed Jim Kelly and Andre Reed (65, Buffalo) vs. New England 11/30/03 for 3rd-most in NFL history. Manning and Harrison passed Dan Marino and Mark Clayton (79, Miami) vs. Tennessee 12/5/04. They set the all-time NFL record with a 6t connection vs. St. Louis 10/17/05. Manning and Harrison have combined for 878 completions for 11,908 yards, the NFL records for completions and yards between two players. The prior NFL records for completions and yards between two players were 663 for 9,538 yards by Kelly and Reed. Young and Rice had 137 games together and Kelly and Reed had 147 games together, while Manning and Harrison have played in 138 games together.

DE-Dwight Freeney, one of 12 Colts with a 3.0+ sack game, had a club rookie record 13 sacks in 2002, along with nine forced fumbles. He had 11 sacks in 2003 and had a club-record 16 in 2004 and now has sacks in 40 of 79 career games and 34 of 66 starts. He was 3-27 sacks and had two forced fumbles at Miami 11/2/03. He had consecutive three-sack games vs. Tennessee 12/5/04 and at Houston 12/12/04. He has 13 career multiple sack games (3, at Miami 11/2/03; 3, vs. Tennessee 12/5/04; 3, at Houston 12/12/04; 3, vs. Cleveland 9/25/05; 3, vs. Cincinnati 12/18/06; 2, vs. Dallas 11/17/02; 2, at Cleveland 12/15/02; 2, vs. Jacksonville 12/29/02; 2, vs. Carolina 10/12/03; 2, vs. Jacksonville 10/24/03; 2, vs. Minnesota 11/8/04; 2, vs. Baltimore 12/19/04; 2, vs. Tennessee 12/4/05). He has four career three-game sack streaks. Freeney's four-game streaks are tied for the 4th-longest (since 1982) in Colts history (8, DE-Robert Mathis, 2005; 6, DE-Dan Footman, 1997; 5, LB-Duane Bickett, 1985; 4, DE-Jon Hand, 1991; 4, LB-Tony Bennett, 1995; 4, LB-Tony Bennett, 1996; 4, DT-Ellis Johnson, 1998; 4, Freeney, 2003; 4, Freeney, 2004). The Colts are 31-9 when Freeney produces a sack. He has four career games with multiple forced fumbles (3, at Philadelphia 11/10/02; 3, vs. Cincinnati 12/18/06; 2 at Tennessee 12/8/02; 2, at Miami 11/2/03). Freeney has 27 career forced fumbles (9, 2002; 4, 2003; 4, 2004; 6, 2005; 4, 2006) and the club is 16-5 in games when Freeney forces a fumble. Freeney has 56.5 career sacks. He ranked among the NFL's all-time top totals for players after their first two career seasons (31, Reggie White; 30, Derrick Thomas; 26, Jevon Kearse; 24, Freeney), the first three career seasons (52, White; 43.5, Thomas; 40, Freeney; 37.5 Richard Dent; 36, Kearse; 36, Anthony Smith) and the first four career seasons (70, White; 58, Thomas; 51, Freeney). Freeney is one of two Colts players to produce consecutive 10+ sack seasons (16, 2004; 13, 2002; 11, 2003; 11, 2005; Robert Mathis, 11.5, 2005; 10.5, 2004). There have been only 12 double-digit sack seasons (since sacks became official in 1982) in Colts history (16, Freeney, 2004; 13, Freeney, 2002; 12, DE-Chad Bratzke, 1999; 11.5, LB-Johnie Cooks, 1984; 11.5, Mathis, 2005; 11, Freeney, 2003; 11, LB-Vernon Maxwell, 1983; 11, Freeney, 2005; 10.5, DE-Tony Bennett, 1995; 10.5, DE-Dan Footman, 1997; 10.5, DE-Robert Mathis, 2004; 10, DE-Jon Hand, 1989). Freeney earned his first Pro Bowl bid in 2003, joining LB-Duane Bickett (1987) as the club's only defensive Pro Bowlers in the team's 23-year Indianapolis era. He became the first Pro Bowl defensive lineman for the team since DT-Mike Barnes and DE-John Dutton in 1977. He earned a second Pro Bowl bid in 2004 and a third in 2005 to be the first Colts defensive player to have three consecutive Pro Bowl bids since Dutton (1975-77). Freeney (16) ranked 1st in NFL sacks in 2004, and became the first Colts player to lead the NFL in sacks since the category became official in 1982. Freeney is 1st in Colts career sacks (50, LB-Duane Bickett).

In a category that has been reached only 28 times in the NFL's 87 seasons, the Colts continue to be repeat performers. In NFL history, there have only been 28 seasonal offenses that have produced a 4,000+ passer and 1,000+ rushers and receivers. QB-Peyton Manning, RB-Edgerrin James and WR-Marvin Harrison accomplished the feat in 1999 and 2000, while the club also did it in 2001 with Manning, Harrison and RB-Dominic Rhodes, the only undrafted rookie free agent in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards. The club narrowly missed accomplishing the feat in 2002 as Manning threw for 4,200 yards, while Harrison amassed 1,722 yards, but RB-Edgerrin James tallied 989 rushing yards while missing two games with injuries. Manning threw for 4,267 yards in 2003, while Harrison totaled 1,272 receiving yards and James notched 1,259 rushing yards. Manning threw for 4,557 yards in 2004, while James produced 1,548 rushing yards and the club had a trio of 1,000+ receivers (1,210, Reggie Wayne; 1,113, Harrison; 1,077, Brandon Stokley) as the club had an unprecedented fifth offense in six years to reach this milestone. Manning (4,397), rookie RB-Joseph Addai (1,081) and WRs-Harrison (1,366) and Wayne (1,310) combined to reach the milestone in 2006. The Colts are the only team ever to do it in consecutive seasons. Here is a look at those prolific offenses:

- ✓ RB Coach **Gene Huey** has served for 240 games, the most games by an assistant (position) coach in Colts history.
- ✓ Since 1998, the Colts have played 22 turnover-free games and own a 20-2 mark while averaging 32.4 points in those games (712).

Prior to the start of the 1998 season with the arrival of Bill Polian and Peyton Manning, the club was 12 games below .500 at home. QUARTERBACK PEYTON MANNING

REWRITING THE RECORD BOOKS: Manning owns club records with 15 4+-TD games, six 5+-TD games and seven 400+-yard games. His 472 passing yards at Kansas City 10/31/04 marked a franchise-best. In 2004, Manning's seasonal completion percentage (67.6), touchdowns (49), passing yardage (4,557) and passer rating (121.1) all marked club records. He set the club career completions mark vs. Houston 9/17/06, surpassing John Unitas' previous record of 2,796. Manning was 20-25-314, 6 TDs at New Orleans 9/28/03 to set the club record for most touchdowns, breaking the record shared by QBs-Gary Cuzzo (11/4/65 at Minnesota) and Gary Hogeboom (10/4/87 at Buffalo). His six TD passes at Detroit 11/25/04 marked his second career 6-TD performance. He set an NFL record with seven career 4,000+ passing seasons at Houston 12/24/06. His 275 career TDs rank 7th all-time.

PEYDIRT: Manning (1998-06) has 20+ TD passes in 9 consecutive seasons, extending his club record. Manning owns 9 of 19 20+-TD seasons in club history (6, Unitas; 3, Jones; 1, Earl Morrall), but only Unitas (1959-60, 65-66) and Jones (1980-81) were able to exceed 20 TDs in consecutive seasons. Manning (1998-06) is the only NFL QB with 25+ touchdowns passes in nine consecutive seasons. He snapped Marino's NFL mark of 48 single-season TDs with his 48th and 49th TD passes vs. San Diego 12/26/04. Manning owns one of four 40+ seasons in NFL history (48, Marino, 1984; 44, Marino, 1986; 41, Kurt Warner, 1999). He owns three of the franchise's four 30+-TD seasons (49, Manning, 2004; 33, Manning, 2000; 32, John Unitas, 1959; 31, Manning, 2006).

"STREAKY MANNING": Manning has had 7 career streaks of consecutive games with TD passes extending into double digits, surpassing Hall of Fame QB-John Unitas (3) for the club record. He has 17 career games without a TD pass, his last game without a TD pass coming at Jacksonville 12/10/06. Manning hit scoring tosses in 27 straight games from 1998-1999. Manning owns 7 of the 11 10+-game streaks in club history (47 games, Unitas (NFL record); 27, Manning; 16, Manning; 13, Manning; 13, Manning; 12, Unitas; 12, Manning; 11, Manning; 11, Manning; 10, Unitas; 10, Jim Harbaugh). Manning produced 13 consecutive 2+-TD games to start 2004, a new NFL record. Manning surpassed John Unitas' 1959 club and NFL record for most multiple-TD games to start a season (1959 was 12-game season). His 13 consecutive multiple-TD games is the NFL record (12, Unitas, 1959; 12, Don Meredith, Dallas, 1965-66; 12, Marino, 1986-87; 12, Favre, 1994-95). Manning hit his first five passes at Tennessee 10/2 to tie Bert Jones' club record (17, vs. NYJ 12/15/74) for consecutive completions with 17 (dating back to Clev. 9/25).

MANNING AND MORE MILESTONES: Manning, a seven-time Pro Bowler (1999, 2000, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006), has produced career totals that rank among the best in the NFL. He is the only player in NFL history with 3,000 passing yards in each of his 1st 9 seasons and he owns 9 of the 15 3,000+ passing seasons in Colts history (3, Unitas; 3, Bert Jones). Manning's streak of 9 consecutive 3,000+ seasons is the 2nd-longest active streak in the NFL (15, Brett Favre, GB), and tied for the 2nd-longest in NFL history (9, Marino). Manning is the only QB in NFL history to throw for 12,000+ yards in the 1st three seasons. He became the 5th QB in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards in consecutive seasons in 2000 (Favre, 1998-99; Dan Fouts, 1979-81; Marino, 1984-86; Warren Moon, 1990-91 and 1994-95), while joining Marino and Fouts as the only

QB's to do it 3 consecutive seasons in 2001 (T. Green since). Manning became the only NFL QB with 4 consecutive 4,000+ seasons in 2002, and he extended his streak of 4,000+ seasons to five in 2003 and six in 2004, tying Dan Marino's all-time NFL mark. Manning posted his 7th 4,000+ season in 2006, a new NFL record.

IRONMAN: Manning has started the first 144 games of his career (the longest career-opening streak of any QB in NFL history and the longest streak in Colts history) and has produced 92 career starting wins, second-most in Colts history (116, Unitas; 47, Jones). Manning's starting record is 92-52 despite starting his career 3-13 as a rookie in 1998. His 24 wins as a starter from 1999-2000 led the NFL. His 89 wins from 1999-06 are the most in the NFL. Manning has won 10+ games in a season 7 times (1999, 2000, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006), 1st among Colts QBs (3, Unitas; 3, Jones). His 144-game start streak is 2nd-longest in the NFL history (237, Brett Favre, Green Bay).

BETWEEN THE LINES: Manning has 20+ comp. in 103 of 144 career games, ranking first in Colts history ahead of John Unitas (33) in career 20+ comp. games. Manning has TD passes in 127 of 144 career games to rank 2nd in Colts history in games with TD passes (144 in 206 career games, Unitas). Manning has had 50+ comp. pct. games 138 times, 55+ comp. pct. games 123 times and 60+ comp. pct. games 101 times. The Colts have scored 30+ points 51 times under the direction of Manning. He has produced 100+ receivers 93 times (10 different receivers). Manning's career Red Zone TD:Int ratio is 165:18. Manning has taken every snap in 122 of 144 games. Manning took all 982 of the team's snaps in 1998 and 958 of the team's 979 snaps in 1999 for a 2-season total of 1,940 of 1,961 plays (he took 1,590 cons. to open career). He took every snap during the 2002 season, and had a streak of 1,631 consecutive snaps end at New Orleans 9/28/03. He took all 1,011 of the team's snaps in 2006. He has taken 8,832 of 9,078 possible snaps from 1998-06. The only other QBs to take snaps from scrimmage during Manning's career are Steve Walsh (21, 1999), Mark Rypien (22, 2001), Brock Huard (22, 2003) and Jim Sorgi (74, 2004; 102, 2005). P-Hunter Smith took one snap in 2000 (fake FG), 2003 (fake FG), 2004 (fake punt) and 2005 (fake FG). RB-Edgerrin James took one direct snap in 2005. Manning has missed one career snap due to injury (vs. Miami, 11/11/01).

MANNING PRODUCES YARDS: The Colts have had 9 cons. seasons of 5,000+ net yards offense. The team had a club-record 6,475 yards in 2004, snapping the record of 6,141 yards in 2000. The club hit 6,000+ yards for the third time with 6,070 in 2006. Manning has engineered 9 of the 14 5,000+ seasons in club history (6,475, 2004; 6,141, 2000; 6,070, 2006; 5,955, 2001; 5,874, 2003; 5,799, 2005; 5,726, 1999; 5,616, 2002; 5,236, 1976; 5,206, 1980; 5,116, 1998; 5,108, 1983; 5,008, 1967; 5,006, 1985).

MANNING AND HARRISON DUO: In 138 games, WR-Marvin Harrison has been on the receiving end of 878 passes for 11,908 yards and 106 TDs from QB-Peyton Manning, the most completions, yards and touchdowns by a tandem in NFL history. The duo passed Jim Kelly and Andre Reed's mark of 663 passes vs. Minnesota 11/8/04 and Kelly and Reed's yardage mark 9/25/05 vs. Cleveland. Manning and Harrison snapped Steve Young and Jerry Rice's NFL mark of 85 TDs by a QB-WR tandem 10/17/05 vs. St. Louis. Kelly and Reed played in 147 games together, while Young and Rice played in 137. Manning and Harrison connected on their 100th career TD pass 12/3/06 at Tennessee on a 68c. Manning and Harrison had 63 TDs from 2000-04 for a new 5-year record by a tandem. The duo has hooked up 14 times for 50+-yard TDs. Harrison held a 13.1 yds/rec. avg. on 14 TDs (14-183) 1996-97 prior to Manning, but holds 23.6 yds/rec. avg. on 106 TDs (106-2,498) 1998-present with Manning. Harrison has totaled 57 of his 59 career 100+ games with Manning at QB.

MISCELLANEOUS: Manning has 53 career 100+ rating games, including three perfect rating games of 158.3 at NO 9/28/03, vs. NE 10/22/00 and at Phil. 11/10/02, the most by any NFL QB since 1973, when the rating system was instituted. The Colts are 45-8 in those 53 games. He has recorded 40 300+-yard efforts, ranking 1st in Colts history (26, Unitas). In 2006, Manning became the second player in club history (Unitas, 1963) to record three consecutive 300+-yard games (vs. Washington 10/22, at Denver 10/29, at New England 11/5). Manning has 25 career 50+-yard TD passes, including a career-high 6 in 2000. He has hit passes to 7 different players 41 times in his career and with 8+ players 10 times. Manning was 25-44-472, 5 TDs/1 int. at Kansas City 10/31/04. The 472 yards was a career best for Manning and marked his fifth career 400+ passing game (440, vs. Jax. 9/25/00; 412 vs. Buf 9/23/01; 404, at SD 9/26/99; 401, vs. NYJ 11/16/03). He had his sixth 400+ performance with 425 vs. Tennessee 12/5 and his seventh such game with 400 yards vs. Houston 9/17/06. Manning is the only player in club history to throw for 400+ yards in multiple games.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: WR-Marvin Harrison has led the Colts in receptions 9 of 11 seasons (1998, Faulk; 2005, Wayne) and receiving yards in 9 of 11 seasons (1998, Faulk; 2004, Wayne), while he has led the team in TDs in 10 of 11 seasons (1998, Small, tied). Harrison has totaled the most receptions by a receiver in NFL history in 1st 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 seasons, the 2006 season being his 11th. Harrison previously held the record for receptions after 4, 5 and 6 seasons until they were broken. Harrison became the 5th player in NFL history with 100+-TD receptions 10/2/05 at Tennessee. Harrison became the 28th NFL player to surpass 600 career receptions, reaching it in 102 games, the fastest pace in NFL history (118, WR-Herman Moore, Det.). He hit 700 career receptions in his 114th game, the fastest pace to that plateau (139 games, Jerry Rice). On 11/8/04, he became the 11th NFL player to hit 800 career receptions, reaching it in 131 career games, the fastest pace in NFL history (154, WR-Jerry Rice, S.F.). Harrison hit the 900-reception mark in his 149th game at Cincinnati 11/20/05, reaching it faster than Rice's previous record of 168 games. Harrison became the fourth NFL receiver to hit 1,000 career receptions in his 167th career game at Jacksonville 12/10/06, the fastest pace in NFL history (Rice, 181).

Harrison broke Berry's (631) club reception record at Tennessee 12/8/02, a record that stood since 1967. He became the Colts career reception yards leader vs. Carolina 10/12/03, breaking Berry's (9,275) club record. Harrison now has produced 8 of the 16 1,000+ reception yardage seasons in Colts history. Harrison is averaging 6.0 receptions per game for his career.

Harrison (143) bested the NFL seasonal record of 123 receptions by Moore (1995) with 9-172, 2 TDs at Cleveland 12/15/02. He has 11 50+ reception seasons, 1st in club history (7, Berry, 1958-62, 65-66) and eight consecutive 80+ seasons, tying WR-Jerry Rice's all-time NFL mark.

Harrison has 18 50+-yard TD receptions, tied for most in franchise history (18, Lenny Moore). Fourteen of those 50+-yard TD receptions have come from Manning. In 2004, he matched his 2001 club-record total of 15 TD receptions. At Baltimore 9/11/05, he surpassed Moore (11,213) for the most scrimmage yards in club history. At New England 11/5/06, Harrison surpassed Moore (113) for the club mark for most career TDs.

HARRISON KEEPS UNIQUE COMPANY: From 1999-2003, Harrison produced the top 5 seasonal reception totals in club history. In 2000, Harrison recorded his 2nd cons. season with 100+ receptions, 1 of only 5 players in NFL history (now 6) to post 100+ receptions in cons. seasons. He narrowed that company in 2001 by joining Jerry Rice and WR-Herman Moore as the only NFL players with 3 cons. 100+ seasons. He is now the only player in NFL history to post 100+ receptions in 4 cons. seasons. He had 13 TD receptions at home in 2001, tying Rice's NFL seasonal record. The 2001 and 2002 seasons marked the only times in Colts history the leading receiver (Harrison, 109, 143) more than doubled the club's 2nd-leading receiver (TE-Marcus Pollard, 47, 2001; RB-Edgerrin James, 47, 2002).

HARRISON HOLDS FRANCHISE MARK: WR-Marvin Harrison has receptions in a franchise-record 170 consecutive games. Harrison surpassed RB-Marshall Faulk (77 games, 1994-98) for the club record and for the longest NFL streak to begin a career (158 games). Harrison has receptions in all 170 career games, the longest consecutive games streak among active NFL players (WR-Jerry Rice holds NFL streak of 274 consecutive games). Harrison has had multiple receptions in 167 of 170 career games, 5+ receptions in 114 games and 6+ receptions in 92 outings. He has 16 career 10+ reception games, 1st in club history (11, Berry, 1955-67).

HARRISON AMONG THE BEST EVER, AGAIN: Harrison had 1,722 receiving yards in 2002, his best seasonal total, surpassing 1,663 yards in 1999. Harrison's total ranks as the 4th-best yardage season in NFL history, while his 1,663 yards in 1999 rank as the 7th-best total. In 2002, Harrison produced his 3rd 1,500+ season, and ranks behind Rice (4, 1986, 1990, 1993, 1995) for 2nd-most in NFL history. Harrison (3, 1999, 2001, 2002) was tied with Irvin (2, 1991, 1995), Charley Hennigan (2, 1961, 1964, Houston Oilers, AFL) and Terry Holt (2, 2000, 2003, St. Louis), but stands as the only NFL player to post consecutive 1,500+ seasons. Only nine other players have achieved one 1,500+ season.

MOVING UP: Harrison is moving up several of the NFL's all-time lists. He became the 4th NFL player to reach the 1,000-catch plateau at Jacksonville 12/10/06. Harrison's 13,697 reception yards rank 6th all-time. Harrison surpassed WR-Andre Reed (13,198) for 6th place on the all-time reception yards list 12/3/06 at Tennessee. Harrison's 122 touchdowns rank 3rd in NFL history, while he ranks 2nd with 59 100+ games (76, Jerry Rice).

WIDE RECEIVER REGGIE WAYNE

CONTINUED IMPROVEMENT: WR-Reggie Wayne continued to distinguish himself as one of the league's top receivers in 2005, and again proved himself to be among the NFL's elite in 2006. Wayne ranked 5th in the AFC with a then career-best 83 receptions and 8th in yards with 1,055 in 2005. In 2006, Wayne made the Pro Bowl and was 86-1,310, 9 TDs with five 100+ games. He finished ranked third in NFL receiving yards and 12th in receptions. Wayne's 86 receptions marked a career-best, and he became the 11th player in NFL history to increase his reception total in the first six seasons of a career.

Wayne was 6-135 vs. Houston 9/17/06 and 7-122, 1 TD vs. Washington 10/22, his 13th career 100+ game. At Denver 10/29, Wayne was a seasonal-best 10-138, 3 TDs, with all three TDs coming in the second half. It marked his 14th career 100+ game, his fourth 10+-reception game and his first 3+-TD game. His three receiving TDs tied the single-game club mark. He was 6-90 at New England 11/5 and 7-111, 1 TD at

Dallas 11/19, his 15th career 100+-game. He recorded his 16th career 100+-game with 8-110 at Jacksonville 12/10/06 (121, at Philadelphia 11/10/02; 103, at Tennessee 12/8/02; 104, vs. NYG 12/22/02; 141, vs. Jacksonville 9/21/03; 141, vs. NYJ 11/16/03; 119, at Tennessee 9/19/04; 184, vs. Green Bay 9/26/04; 119, at Kansas City 10/31/04; 106, at Chicago 11/21/04; 124, at New England 11/7/05; 117, at Cincinnati 11/20/05; 135, vs. Houston 9/17/06; 122, vs. Washington 10/22/06; 138, at Denver 10/29/06; 111, at Dallas 11/19/06; 110, at Jacksonville 12/10/06). He also has four 10+-reception games.

Wayne became the first Colts wide receiver other than Marvin Harrison to record consecutive 100+ games (7-119, 1 TD at Tenn.; 11-184, 1 TD vs. GB) since WR-Reggie Langhorne in 1993.

DEEP THREAT: Wayne has continued to give QB-Peyton Manning another deep-threat option alongside WR-Marvin Harrison. Wayne had a 42-yard reception at New England 9/9/04 and followed with a 44-yard snare 9/19 at Tennessee. Wayne recorded a 36t from Manning 9/26 vs. Green Bay, marking his third-consecutive game with a 30+-yard reception. Wayne added a 35t snare vs. Oakland 10/10 and had three 20+-yard receptions (23, 41t, 31) at Kansas City 10/31. He had two TDs (35t, 27t) at Chicago 11/21. He had a 40-yard reception 12/5 vs. Tennessee and a 35-yard snare 12/26 vs. San Diego. Wayne caught a career-long 71t snare from QB-Jim Sorgi at Denver 1/2/05. Wayne's prior career-long from Manning was a 57t 10/26/03 vs. Houston. He had a 51-yard reception vs. Cleveland 9/25/05 and a 25t at Tennessee 10/2. Wayne and Manning hooked up for a 66t 11/20/05 at Cincinnati, the duo's longest connection. His 51t from Manning 10/22/06 was a seasonal-long. Wayne averaged 15.2 yards per catch in 2006.

RUNNING BACK DUO - RHODES AND ADDAI

RBs-Dominic Rhodes and **Joseph Addai** are responsible for filling the void at RB left by Colts' all-time leading rusher Edgerrin James. The duo combined for 1,722 yards and 12 touchdowns rushing in 2006. Rhodes was 187-641, 5 TDs, while Addai was 226-1,081, 7 TDs. Rhodes and Addai totaled 100+-yards in eight games, and the tandem also combined for 76-576, 1 TD receiving.

Addai had two 100+-yard rushing games and eclipsed 80+-rushing yards six times and 100+-scrimmage yards six times. He finished ranked 8th in AFC rushing, 5th in AFC scrimmage yards and 3rd in AFC first downs. He had a career-high 171 yards and four touchdowns rushing vs.

Philadelphia 11/26, tying the club mark for most single-game rushing TDs. With first-half TD runs of 15, 10 and 15 yards, Addai became the second player in NFL history with three first-half TD runs of 10+-yards. Addai had 208 scrimmage yards vs. Philadelphia, becoming the fourth Colts rookie in club history to surpass 200+-scrimmage yards in a game (Lenny Moore, Marshall Faulk, Edgerrin James).

With 100 rushing yards at Houston 12/24, Addai became the fourth Colts rookie rusher to eclipse the 1,000-yard rushing mark (1,553, Edgerrin James, 1999; 1,282, Marshall Faulk, 1994; 1,104, Dominic Rhodes, 2001).

DEFENSIVE ENDS DWIGHT FREENEY AND ROBERT MATHIS

DE-Dwight Freeney, a three-time Pro-Bowler (2003-05) and the franchise leader in career sacks with 56.5, led the NFL with 16 sacks in 2004, becoming the Colts' first NFL sack leader. His 16 sacks also surpassed his previous club mark of 13 in 2002. Freeney has 5.5 sacks in 2006, including three sacks and three FF vs. Cincinnati 12/18/06. Freeney finished with 11 sacks in 2005. Freeney surpassed LB-Duane Bickett's mark (50 sacks) vs. San Diego 12/18/05. Freeney has 27 career FF. He owns five three-sack games, including consecutive three-sack performances vs. Tennessee 12/5/04 and at Houston 12/12/04. Freeney owns two career four-game sack streaks, tying the fourth-longest streak in club history. Freeney has had sacks in 40 of 79 career games and in 34 of 66 career starts. The club is 31-9 when he has a sack and 16-5 when he forces a fumble. He has 13 multiple-sack games and 4 multiple-fumbles forced games. He had 19t FR at New Orleans 9/28/03 for 1st career score. In 2002, he had sacks in 10 different games. He had his 1st career start at Philadelphia and had 7 solo tackles, 1 sack and 3 FF in winning AFC Defensive Player-of-the-Week honors. He now has produced four of the 12 10+ sack seasons for the Colts since 1982 (see chart to right).

DE-Robert Mathis had 9.5 sacks in 2006, including four multiple-sack outings vs. Houston, at NY Jets, vs. Buffalo and vs. Philadelphia. Mathis also had four FF in 2006. He finished with a career-best 11.5 sacks in 2005, and he recorded a sack in 11 of 13 games. Mathis recorded the 11th 10+-sack season in club history with his 10th seasonal sack at Cincinnati 11/20, and he and Freeney are the only players to record back-to-back double-digit sack seasons in franchise history.

Mathis extended his streak of consecutive games with a sack to seven at Houston 11/23/05, surpassing DE-Dan Footman's club record of six. Mathis had a sack and FF at New England 11/23, extending his club record of consecutive-sack games to eight, tied for third-best in NFL history. His streak ended 11/13 vs. Houston. He has four multi-sack games in his career (3, vs. Houston 11/14/04; 2, vs. Tennessee 9/14/03; 2, vs. Oakland 10/10/04; 2, at San Francisco 10/9).

Mathis had 10.5 sacks in 2004, ranking T3rd in the AFC and T13th in the NFL. Mathis had three sacks vs. Houston 11/14, marking then just the 16th time in Colts history a player has had three sacks in a game (dating back to when sacks became official in 1982). Mathis also had three fumbles forced vs. Houston, the first time a Colts player has had three fumbles forced since Dwight Freeney vs. Philadelphia 11/10/02. In 2004, he became the 10th Colts player to record a 10+-sack season since 1982.

LB-CATO JUNE

LBs-Cato June led the Colts with 162 stops, 85 solo, in 2006. June, a 2005 Pro Bowl choice, had four consecutive 10+-tackle games vs. Jacksonville 9/24, at New York Jets 10/1, vs. Tennessee 10/8 and vs. Washington 10/22, including a career-high 16 stops vs. Washington. After leading the club with five interceptions in 2005, June had three in 2006.

He had his third career multiple-interception game 11/5/06 at New England. His other multiple-interception games came at San Francisco 10/9/05 and vs. St. Louis 10/17/05.

OFFENSIVE LINE

DURABILITY: LT-Tarik Glenn had started 101 consecutive games to open his career, but the streak ended 10/12/03 vs. Carolina due to a knee injury. Glenn had started every game at LT from 1998-03 and had not missed a snap until the Carolina game. His 101 consecutive starts and games played led the team. Glenn opened in 1997, becoming the club's first rookie OL starter (along with Adam Meadows) since 1984. C-Jeff Saturday played in 85 consecutive games and started 75 consecutively, but those streaks ended 12/5/04 vs. Tennessee due to a calf injury. RT-Ryan Diem is starting for the fifth consecutive season.

The continuity and ability of the line play has allowed the offense to accomplish the following: allowed 155 sacks in the last 129 games (overall, the lowest in the NFL); paved the way for RB-Edgerrin James to win 2 consecutive NFL rushing titles and produce 49 100+ rushing games; helped FA RB-Dominic Rhodes (233-1,104, 9 TDs rushing/34-224 receiving, 1,328 scrimmage yards, 2001) produce the best season ever by an undrafted free agent RB in NFL history; aided WR-Marvin Harrison (115-1,663, 1999; 102-1,413, 2000; 109-1,524, 2001; 143-1,722, 2002; 95-1,366, 2006; 94-1,272, 2003) produce the 6 finest reception seasons in club history, while allowing him to become the only NFL player with 4 consecutive 100+ reception seasons. The Colts produced 10 individual 100+ rushing performances in 2001 (5, James; 5, Rhodes), the most by any NFL team. The 10 individual 100+ games tied the club-record seasonal best of 10 in 1999, while the club did it 9 times in 2000 (and 2005). Thus, since 1999, the club's offensive line has helped Manning produce the 9 highest seasonal yardage passing totals in franchise history (4,557, 2004; 4,413, 2000; 4,397, 2006; 4,267, 2003; 4,200, 2002; 4,135, 1999;

It helped James win two rushing titles (1,553; 1999; 1,709, 2000) and Rhodes (1,104) to become the most productive NFL rookie undrafted FA. The 2001 season marked the 5th straight season the club had a 1,000+ rusher.

The offensive line play has helped the club have nine consecutive seasons with 5,000+ net yards offense (5,116, 1998; 5,726, 1999; 6,141, 2000; 5,955, 2001, 5,616, 2002; 5,874, 2003; 6,475, 2004; 5,799, 2005; 6,070, 2006). The Colts produced a club-record 6,475 yards in 2004, bettering the previous record of 6,141 net yards in 2000.

The six-best ratios of sacks per pass plays in the club's 53-year history have been accomplished since 1998: 1 sack for 40.0 pass plays in 1999 (560 pass plays, 14 sacks), 1 for 38.6 in 2004 (541 pass plays, 14 sacks), 1 for 38.1 in 2006 (572, 15), 1 for 30.9 in 2003 (569, 19), 1 for 29.6 in 2000 (591, 20), 1 for 26.7 in 2002 (614, 23) and 1 for 27.2 in 1998 (598, 22). The club allowed 1 for 19.6 in 2001 (587, 30). Prior to 1998, the best ratios in Colts history were 1 for 23.6 in 1969 (448, 19) and 1 for 21.5 in 1993 (623, 29). The club's ratio in 2005 was 1 for 26.8 pass plays (535 pass plays, 20 sacks). The Colts allowed 15 sacks on 572 pass plays in 2006, a 1 for 38.1 ratio.
