

# NFL PRESS BOX NOTES - KICKOFF 2005 WEEKEND

<u>MILESTONE PASSERS</u>: Green Bay Packers quarterback **BRETT FAVRE** kicks off his 15th season on Sunday in the same place he would like it to end, Detroit's Ford Field, site of Super Bowl XL.

Favre, owner of an 18-8 (.692) career record against the Lions, enters the game with 49,734 career passing yards. With 266 more, Favre would join Pro Football Hall of Famers **DAN MARINO** (61,361) and **JOHN ELWAY** (51,475) as the only players in NFL history with 50,000 career passing yards.

Meanwhile in San Diego, quarterback **DREW BLEDSOE** makes his first start as a member of the Dallas Cowboys when they visit the Chargers. A four-time Pro Bowler, Bledsoe has passed for 39,808 yards and needs 192 to become the 10th player all-time with 40,000 passing yards.

**TOUCHDOWN TOMLINSON:** San Diego Chargers running back **LA DAINIAN TOMLINSON** has been no stranger to the end zone in his four NFL seasons, rushing for 54 touchdowns in 63 games.

Tomlinson enters 2005 aiming to extend a streak of 12 consecutive games with a rushing touchdown, the third longest such streak in history. With a rushing touchdown on Sunday against Dallas, Tomlinson will tie **JOHN RIGGINS** and **GEORGE ROGERS** for the NFL record.

The former TCU standout has been a frequent visitor to the end zone on his four previous Kickoff Weekend appearances, rushing for four total touchdowns.

<u>SHAUN SCORES...AGAIN</u>: Since becoming the Seattle Seahawks' starting running back in 2001, **SHAUN ALEXANDER** has established himself as one of the premier rushers in football. Over that span, the former Alabama star has scored 70 touchdowns, second-most in the NFL to Kansas City's **PRIEST HOLMES** (76).

In each of those four seasons, Alexander has totaled at least 15 touchdowns – the best such streak in history. In addition, Alexander has scored at least one touchdown rushing and receiving in two consecutive Kickoff Weekend games. If he accomplishes the feat again on Sunday against Jacksonville, he will become the first player in league annals to do so for three Kickoff games in a row.

**SEPTEMBER STANDOUTS:** When the Tampa Bay Buccaneers travel to Minnesota to face the Vikings on Sunday, both starting quarterbacks should be in excellent form. After all, it's September.

**BRIAN GRIESE** of the Buccaneers and **DAUNTE CULPEPPER** of the Vikings are among the league's most successful September passers.

Griese's 101.1 passer rating in the month is second highest in the league since 2000, trailing only **PEYTON MANNING**'s 103.5. Culpepper ranks fourth in September since 2000 in touchdown passes (24) and passing yards (3,951).

**FAMILIARITY ON THE SIDELINES:** The Pittsburgh Steelers and Tennessee Titans are familiar rivals, with the franchises having played each other at least once a year in 35 of the past 36 seasons, including this Sunday's season-opening contest at Pittsburgh's Heinz Field.

The familiarity of the former division rivals, who spent 1970-2001 as members of the AFC Central Division, extends to the sidelines. Steelers head coach **BILL COWHER** begins his 14th season with the club while Titans head coach **JEFF FISHER** kicks off his 12th year with Tennessee. The pair ranks Nos. 1 and 2 among active head coaches for the longest tenures with their current teams.

Cowher has led the Steelers to a 138-86-1 (.616) record since 1992 while Fisher has guided the Titans to a 98-77 (.560) mark since 1994.
