

NFL PRESS BOX NOTES - WILD CARD WEEKEND

2005 PLAYOFFS – **A STRONG FIELD**: The 12 participants in the 2005 NFL playoffs have the <u>most victories</u> of any playoff field ever – 138. Their combined winning percentage (.719, 138-54) is the <u>highest by a playoff field in 28 years</u> (1977; .732, 82-30).

Ten of the teams (Carolina, Chicago, Cincinnati, Denver, Indianapolis, Jacksonville, New York Giants, Pittsburgh, Seattle and Tampa Bay) have at least 11 wins, the <u>most ever in a season</u>.

FROM WILD CARD TO SUPER BOWL: Wild Card teams/non-division winners have advanced to the Super Bowl eight times – including the Baltimore Ravens in 2000 when they became the fourth Wild Card team/non-division winner to win a Super Bowl.

The Kansas City Chiefs performed the Super Bowl feat in 1969, the Oakland Raiders in 1980 and the Denver Broncos in 1997.

The eight Wild Card/non-division winners to play in Super Bowls:

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ON THE ROAD: Since 1990, when the current 12-team playoff format was instituted, at least one road team has won a Wild Card game in 13 of those 15 postseasons (86.7 percent).

STREAKING PATS: On their way to winning three of the past four Super Bowls, the New England Patriots have won nine consecutive playoff games. That streak gives New England's **TOM BRADY** the most consecutive playoff wins by a quarterback who began his career in the Super Bowl era.

It also places the Patriots in a tie for the most consecutive playoff wins by a team. With a victory Saturday night over Jacksonville, New England will move into first place in the category.

Following are the five most consecutive playoff wins by a team all-time, and the five most consecutive playoff wins by a quarterback in the Super Bowl era:

<u>JOE ON THE GO</u>: Pro Football Hall of Fame member and Washington Redskins head coach **JOE GIBBS** has the highest winning percentage among the top five coaches with the most career playoff victories (.762, 16-5).

With a win Saturday against Tampa Bay, Gibbs will move into sole possession of third place in total playoff wins.

PLAYOFF GIANT: The New York Giants have won their division for an NFL-record 21st time and qualified for the playoffs for the 27th time, tying the NFL record for most playoff seasons by a club.
