## PRESS BOX NOTES - AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

**RETURN ENGAGEMENT:** For the 11th time since 1990 when the NFL went to the 12-team playoff format, teams that met at least once during the regular season will meet in the AFC Championship Game when the New England Patriots face the Indianapolis Colts. If Indianapolis defeats New England, it will mark the seventh time that the team that won the regular season meeting(s) won the AFC Championship.

<u>COLTS STRIVE TOWARDS PERFECT 10 AT HOME</u>: The Colts are 9-0 at the RCA Dome this season, including their Wild Card victory over Kansas City. Indianapolis can become the 10th team in history to post a 10-0 home season.

Of the nine teams to accomplish the feat, seven won the Super Bowl. The nine teams that have gone 10-0 at home in a season:

<u>IT'S A TEAM SPORT</u>: The Patriots have reached the conference championship game without a 1,000-yard rusher or receiver. They are attempting to become the first such team to advance to the Super Bowl since the 2003 Patriots.

**GRAND TANDEMS:** The Colts are the sixth team since 1980 to advance to their conference championship game with a 4,000-yard passer, two 1,000-yard receivers and a 1,000-yard rusher. They will attempt to become the first such team to reach the Super Bowl since the 2001 St. Louis Rams.

<u>FIRST-YEAR PHENOMS</u>: Colts running back **JOSEPH ADDAI** is the seventh rookie since 1970 to rush for 1,000 yards and help his team to the AFC Championship Game. With an Indianapolis win Sunday, Addai will become the fourth such running back to reach the Super Bowl.

**TERRIFIC TOM:** Patriots quarterback Tom Brady has thrown a touchdown pass in 11 consecutive playoff games dating to Super Bowl XXXVI. His streak places him third in the category in playoff history.

**LAMAR HUNT TROPHY**: Super Bowl XV MVP **JIM PLUNKETT** will present the **LAMAR HUNT TROPHY** to the winner of the AFC Championship Game. Plunkett won two AFC titles and two Super Bowls (XV, XVIII) with the Oakland-L.A. Raiders.

Plunkett was selected as the Super Bowl XV MVP for completing 13 of 21 attempts for 261 yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions in the Raiders' 27-10 win over Philadelphia.

The late Hunt, the founder of the Kansas City Chiefs and American Football League, helped professional football attain its stature as America's No. 1 sport. In the 10-year history of the AFL, his team posted the most wins (87) and earned berths in two of the first four Super Bowls, including a victory in Super Bowl IV. In 1972, Hunt became the first person from the AFL to be enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.
