

NFL PRESS BOX NOTES – WEEK 2

KEEP HOPE ALIVE: At the end of Week 2, no more than 13 teams will be able to claim a perfect 2-0 record, leaving at least 19 clubs at 1-1 or 0-2.

Since realignment in 2002, 31 of the 48 playoff teams (64.6 percent) began the year at either 1-1 or 0-2. Three of the past five Super Bowl champions began their seasons with a 1-1 or 0-2 record.

LIFE BEGINS AT 60: When New England travels to New York to face the Jets on Sunday, Patriots quarterback **TOM BRADY** will seek to tie the mark for fewest games started to reach 60 victories in the NFL's Super Bowl era (since 1966).

Brady has 59 wins in 79 starts, and can tie **KEN STABLER** and **ROGER STAUBACH** at 80 for the fewest games needed for 60 victories.

HAIL TO THE CHIEF: With a reception Sunday against AFC West rival Denver, Kansas City's **TONY GONZALEZ** (85) would tie **WESLEY WALLS** (86) for the fourth longest streak in history of consecutive games with a catch by a tight end. Gonzalez has a reception of at least 30 yards in eight of his past 10 games against the Broncos.

SERIES-LY CLOSE: AFC North Division rivals will meet this Sunday when the Cleveland Browns travel to face the Cincinnati Bengals.

The teams share one of the NFL's most even rivalries. The Browns hold a 33-32 edge in the series and the teams' point totals favor Cleveland by nine points: 1,354 to 1,345.

CATCHY COLT: Indianapolis wide receiver **MARVIN HARRISON** can claim a pair of receiving milestones this Sunday when the Colts host Houston.

The most productive receiver in Colts history needs five catches to move into fifth place on the all-time NFL receptions chart. With nine catches last week against the Giants, Harrison (936) is in position to surpass **ART MONK** (940).

In addition to climbing the career receptions list this week, Harrison can set the standard for an 11-year receiver.

Harrison needs seven catches to post the most receptions by a player in 11 seasons, surpassing **JERRY RICE**, who amassed 942 through the first 11 of his 20 NFL seasons.

START ME UP: Four of the five teams with the best August/September regular-season winning percentages since 1990 face each other this week in divisional action as Miami hosts Buffalo and Kansas City travels to Denver.

Uncharacteristically, all four clubs aim to bounce back from a rare early-season loss on Kickoff Weekend. Minnesota – the fourth-winningest team in the category -- will attempt to post consecutive victories when it hosts Carolina.
